Negro Defendant Is Charged With Killing Two Women At Inwood

The prosecution testimony was nearing completion this noon in the first degree murder trial of Chester White, Inwood negro, before Judge Cortland A. Johnson and a jury in Nassau county court.

White is charged with murdering Willie Mae Howard, 16, and her mother, Mrs. Fanny Davis at their home, 204 Walcott street, Inwood, March 29. He is being tried on the specific indictment charging the murder of the daughter.

Inspector Harold R. King, Detective Lieutenant William Vaughan and precinct were among the state's witnesses who testified. It was charged that White became enraged at Mrs. Davis because she had told him that their friendship was at an end.

Statements made by White following his arrest in which he allegedly admitted murdering the two women with a hammer, and then locking the door of their apartment, were read prosecuting the case with George Beaubian and Moxie Rigby defend-
