


















William Joyce Sewell Born in County Mayo, Ireland he became a Union Army officer during the American Civil War. He received America's highest military decoration, the Medal of Honor for his actions at the Battle of Chancellorsville. He was the only officer to be awarded the Medal of Honor while in command of a New Jersey regiment. He was severely wounded at the July 1863 Battle of Gettysburg. After the war, General Sewell worked in the railroad industry in New Jersey becoming vice president of the West Jersey & Seashore Railroad Company. He was also a U.S. Senator from New Jersey.


By 1866 he had overseen construction of the standard gauge tracks from Woodbury to Glassboro. In 1867 he formed a merger with the Millville and Glassboro Railroad Company headed by Samuel A. Whitney, owner of the Whitney Glass Works in Glassboro. This company had just completed a line extension to Cape May and the merger allowed W J R.R. passengers boarding in Philadelphia and Camden to visit Wenonah and then continue to Atlantic City and Cape May resorts.

# Father of Standard Time in the United States

William Allen, born in Bordentown, NJ was a civil engineer by profession. He received his education in private schools and at the age of 15 commenced his railroad career as a rodman on the Camden & Amboy Railroad in 1862. At the age of 16 he was promoted to assistant engineer, and at 21 became the resident engineer of the railroad. In 1870 while serving in that capacity he helped found the town of Wenonah, NJ. Mr. Allen as an early employee of one of the rail lines that became part of the Pennsylvania Railroad System, was the leader in the adoption of standard time and the time zones that serve our country so well today.


















## Thomas Whitney Synnott 1845 - 1941

Born in Glassboro New Jersey in 1845 he was the son of Dr. Myles (Glassboro's first physician) and Harriet Heston (Whitney). He married Mary D. Eldridge and they had three children, two of whom died in infancy. Surviving child Clayton Eldridge Synnott was born in 1876.

From 1870 Thomas W. Synnott was the guiding force in one of the oldest and largest glass manufacturing establishments in the country. The plant in Glassboro, first known as Heston's Glass Works later became the .

Whitney Glass Works of which he became its president, a position he retained until retiring in 1892.

Mr. Synnott was active in the creation of Wenonah and his mansion, built in 1884 at the corner of N. Clinton and E. Mantua Avenues still stands today, beautifully preserved. He built the Wenonah Memorial Presbyterian Church as a memorial to his mother

His son Clayton and grandson Thomas W. Synnott II lived in Woodbury, moving to Wenonah sometime prior to the death of the first Thomas Synnott. Dr. Clayton Synnott died in 1941. Thomas II died in Wenonah in 1992.

A noted philanthropist, Thomas Whitney Synnott's contributions in the religious community, in body and financial were legend.





Born in Manchester Maine Mr. Farr came to New Jersey in 1870, moving into Wenonah in 1875.

His ancestors in Maine bought up old sails, painted them and sold them as floor coverings. The product came to be known as "oilcloth" and eventually linoleum.

He was president of the family linoleum manufacturing business Farr & Bailey in Camden NJ. Locally he was clerk of the Wenonah Board of Education for 25 years.

The family home is located at E. Mantua Avenue at S. Princeton Avenue. It was completed and occupied in 1897. It is still known by the name "Little Grange."

His mother Hannah founded the library in Wenonah. She died in Rome while on a trip to Italy in 1912 at age 71.


Mr. Farr built the Wenonah Free Public Library in her honor and donated it to the town.



















Stephen Greene (deceased 1902)

Stephen Greene played a great part in the development of Wenonah. His involvement in the purchase of the Wenonah Hotel in 1892, which became the Wenonah Military Academy, probably assisted the town in surviving the great depression of the late 1920s and early 1930s.


Stephen Greene owned a substantial part of the southeast quadrant of Wenonah. He built the town's first sanitary sewer system to serve the Hotel and his various properties. He had exotic gardens and greenhouses, a few of which still remain.


The Wenonah Military Academy opened for business September 20, 1904 and lasted until September 1935 when it closed its doors forever, seemingly a victim of the depression. During its thirty years of existence the Academy gained renown throughout the country and had many students from foreign countries.



Corner S. Clinton Ave. & E. Cedar St. circa 1886






