Wenonah a Century Ago

Excerpts from the *Woodbury Constitution*, February 1921 Courtesy of the Gloucester County Historical Society

- The Valentine Dance, the third of a series given by the Arthur Holeton Post of the American Legion, on Saturday evening, in the Academy Drill Hall, was a great success financially as well as socially. There were about 350 guests from far and near who enjoyed dancing to the wonderful music rendered by the Wysocka Orchestra, of Camden, until midnight at which time the Atlantic City flyer was stopped to take a large number of the pleasure seekers to their various home towns. The decorations were unusually fine, much credit being due to the valuable assistance of Miss Phyllis Wood and the committee in charge. The orchestra was seated inside a heart outlined with rails covered with red crepe paper surrounded by a series of hearts, all of which were lighted with electric lights and candles, presenting a very unique effect, and comments of praise were heard on all sides. The committee in charge of the dance certainly knows how to arrange these affairs as each one has been more enjoyable than the previous one. The Legion wishes to thank Miss Wood and also the Ladies' Auxiliary who lent their assistance in the matter of refreshments so creditably as well as any others who helped in any • way to make the occasion a success.
- A meeting was held in the fire house on Thursday evening to reorganize the auxiliary to our fire company. An election of officers was held with the following result: President, Mrs. John Drummer; Vice President, Mrs. Alex. Ralston; Secretary, Mrs. Bea Leap; Treasurer, Mrs. George Greenig, Jr.; collectors, Mrs. C. Mattson, chairman, Mrs. Geo. Krayer, Mrs. John Ford and Mrs. Geo. Parks. After the election it was decided to have four col-

lectors to call at every house in town to solicit the name of every woman in membership. Even though unable to attend the monthly meetings, every one should be identified with the organization as their dues will help the cause. Every one expects the firemen to respond willingly if need should arise in their homes so all should be ready to do all in their power to help make our fire company one of the best in every particular. The auxiliary will meet on the first Monday night in the month starting on March seventh. It was decided to hold a cake and bread sale in the near future.

- Mr. Edw. Geeher, Mrs. R.A. Sargent and Mr. Stephen Warren were elected for three terms and Major Snyder for one year on the public school Board at the elections held in the school house Tuesday evening. The \$9050 appropriation was passed.
- The Wenonah Masonic Club held a reorganization smoker in the fire house on Friday evening. Talent from Philadelphia provided a fine entertainment and the fifty members present spent a most enjoyable evening.
- The Military Academy mid-year dance was one of the largest in the history of the school. The drill hall was tastefully decorated with the national colors and together with the beautiful gowns of the guests, who came from far and near, made a beautiful scene to look upon. Kammerer's Orchestra of Philadelphia rendered the delightful music which added much tto the pleasure of the occasion. The drills given by the cadets were fine, showing the careful training given by efficient instructors. Altogether the evening was a long to be remembered affair.
