Philadelphia, Nov. 5 .- Pennsylvania has gone Republican again by an overwhelming majority. For the third time in the history of the state more than 1,000,000 votes were polled at an election. The two occasions prior to vesterday were in 1896 and 1900, when McKinley was elected to the presidency.

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
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
