Wikes-Barre, Pa. - Between managing a semi-pro club in Ogden, Utah, and scouting young ball players for the Cincinnati the Senators clash with Wilkes- Connie Mack admits he made National League team, Bill McCorry, former manager of Albany Barre in a double header tonight a mistake when he let. Herb Penclubs, is keeping on the move.

A note from McCorry from Denver reads:

"Here for a few days looking at some young ball players. Passed last evening with Tom O'Hara, who is working here and looks fine."

O'Hara and McCorry were members of the Albany club of the old New York State League in 1911 and McCorry's mention of O'Hara causes us to recall there are some old-time fans, who still insist that the Albany outfield of those days with O'Hara in left field, Chick Hartley in center field and Bill Kay in right field was the best ever to roam the gardens for an Albany club.

Some will challenge the views of the old-timers and tell you the best Albany outfield was the one McCorry had when the Senators won the Eastern League pennant in 1929. This included Yank Yordy, Johnny Gill and Gerald Fitzgerald. Still others give the palm to the 1934 group of Joe Mowry, Jake Powell and Freddie Sington. In 1934, the Senators were in the International League and qualified for the playoffs after getting off to a poor start.

Kay, Hartley and O'Hara, batting against the deadest of dead baseballs, did some effective hitting in 1910. The figures give you some idea of the way they attacked opposing pitchers. Kay hit .337, Hartley batted .323 and O'Hara finished with .282.

Pitchers at Best

In the days the O'Hara-Kay-Hartley trio performed for the pleasure of patrons of baseball in old Chadwick Park, now Rewkins Stadium, the pitchers were supreme. Trick deliveries -the spitter, shiner and what not-were allowed. Balls n't thrown out when they

Senators Fourth Albany's infield that year had Art Brown and Buck Freeman At first base; Pete O'Brien at

second base; Jimmy Tamsett at short, Scrappy Hess at third and Harry Cheek and Red Rowe behind the plate. The team was a consistent third in the race up to the last two weeks of the season when it dropped to fourth place. Kay, Hartley and O'Hara were the only hitters on the club. Freeman batted only 228,

Hess, .224; Cheek, .195; Rowe, .192; Brown, .187; Tamsett, .178.

Tamsett was pretty much the same kind of a player as Bernie Snyder of the current edition of the Albany club. He was a great fielder, but a light sticker. Baseball men of his time insisted there wasn't a shortstop in baseball, who could outfield the Senator. Jimmy led the shortstops in the New York State League defensively. Playing in 131 games, he accepted 780 chances. He was a wonder in tagging

base runners. In all the years he played, it was said of him that no runner ever slid away from him.

Injuries Hurt Team

Charles M. Winchester, who still is interested in Albany baseball today as a fan, was the owner of the Senators in 1911 and his managers were Roarin' Bill Clarke, now baseball coach at Princeton University and

Tamsett. Winchester had succeeded in giving Albany a pennant winning team in 1907 and he and Clarke figured they had another championship club in 1911, but Clarke resigned before the campaign opened and Tamsett took over.
